Year in Review 2011-2012

July • The CCIB funds summer research projects for Tom Betts, Brian Cawley, and Peter Snyder, three Calvin faculty members. The grant recipients choose to research three unique initiatives, including the complexities of strategic enrollment at Christian colleges and universities today.

August → Bob Eames and Gwen Vryhof Bultema meet with numerous businesses throughout Michigan to secure CAP project opportunities for the 2011-2012 school year. Many commit to engaging students in project-based learning courses, including Bissell, Gentex, and Gordon Food Service.

Bob Eames and Gwen Vryhof Bultema meet with Mary Tuuk, the president of Fifth Third West Michigan, to discuss the development of educational programs that encourage young women to consider business-related careers.

September ◆ Peter Snyder, a member of the Business Department faculty, receives a major grant to draft and develop a paper on the role of practices and routines in organizational stability and change. Snyder's research informs a DCM class and also changes how Snyder approaches his organizational behavior and management class.


October ◆ Six students compete in Calvin's second-annual Idea Pitch Competition. Kim VandenAkker, a senior international development major, wins the competition. Her winning idea is a non-profit job-shadowing website for middle and high schools.

November ◆ Kim VandenAkker represents Calvin at the Regional Idea Pitch Competition, a competition put on by the West Michigan Colleges and Universities Group (WMCUG). VandenAkker wins the competition, besting students from six area schools.

December ◆ CAP teams present their findings to 22 unique project sponsors, including Wolverine Worldwide, Bissell, Gentex, Steelcase, Christian Schools International, and the Association for a More Just Society.

January ◆ Myrna Anderson, a talented writer and a member of Calvin's communications & marketing team, and Professor Leonard Van Drunen lead a group of students to India on a business interim. The trip includes twelve distinct internships, which allows participating students to work alongside their Indian peers.

Bob Eames and Evert VanDerHeide lead a group of students to Brazil, one of the world's upcoming economic powers. The CCIB originally funded the development of the interim course and also helped supplement travel for the group, which visited three regions and several global companies including Vermeer, VW, and Whirlpool.



Bob Eames is honored with an award for Community-Based Teaching. This award recognized Eames' project work in each of his classes, which promote effective learning in partnership with area businesses.

March → Calvin hosts its 5th Annual BizPlan Competition. The competition allows students to create business plans using an intense, hands-on approach. Jonathan Borak and Josiah Gamroth, political science and small business management majors, enter "Innovative Solar Systems" into the competition and win. The CCIB and SoundOff Signal sponsor the event.

April → The CCIB hosts WMCUG's 3rd annual West Michigan Business Plan Competition in the Covenant Fine Arts Center Recital Hall. Phil Catlett, executive director of the Better Business Bureau, moderates the event, and the competition is judged by well-known business professionals from throughout the midwest. The event sees its best attendance yet. Calvin's Jonathan Borak and Josiah Gamroth compete and take third place.

May ◆ The CCIB hosts more than 400 West Michigan-based business professionals at the Chick-Fil-A Leadercast. Calvin students and staff are invited to attend the event at a significantly reduced rate, thanks to CCIB sponsorship.

CAP teams present their findings to 29 unique project sponsors, including Hudsonville Ice Cream, Wolverine Worldwide, Herman Miller, Railside Golf Club, Exxel Engineering, and Sietsema Orchards.

June - The poster and presentation pieces researched by Tom Betts, Bob Eames, and Gwen Vryhof Bultema are accepted for presentation at the Christian Business Faculty Association Conference (CBFA) in British Columbia. The projects describe the models and theoretical grounding for using of experiential learning in Christian higher education.

Chair of the Business Department, Leonard Van Drunen, presents "Finance and Christianity," a research paper written for the Theology of Work Project, during



Calvin Hosts Young Women's Business Institute

Twelve young women, entering their senior year of high school, attended the Calvin Young Women's Business Institute, from July 18-20. This 3 day program exposed young women to business-related careers, as well as introduced them to business women as possible mentors and role models. To be considered for the institute, applicants needed a minimum GPA of 3.5, be involved in extracurricular activities, and provide a letter of recommendation.

"Achieving excellence in business at Calvin requires two key ingredients: great students and excellent faculty," said Bob Eames, director of the CCIB. "The institute allows us to help young women explore opportunities in business while they learn what an exceptional place Calvin is to prepare for lives of kingdom service."

One of the highlights of the program was a dinner and networking reception at Uptown Kitchen. Kelly LeCoy, the owner of Uptown Kitchen and a recent Calvin graduate, attended the event, along with several other business women from the greater Grand Rapids area. Mary Tuuk, the president of Fifth Third

Bank West Michigan, also attended the event. Tuuk had originally encouraged the CCIB to consider specific programming for young women and was instrumental in the development of the institute.

"Helping young women dream about their future and envision possibilities in business is a passion of mine," says Tuuk. "Seeing this passion and vision come to life with the Calvin Young Women's Business Institute was a dream come true for me. Most importantly, it furthers the ability of these young women to see and realize the potential of the talents given to them by God."

The young women also participated in a human-centered design workshop led by representatives from Amway and held at Grid70, a design hub located in downtown Grand Rapids. Students were tasked with observing the buying experience at the Fulton Street Market before identifying new products or programs to better serve consumers.

"The institute encouraged me to look deeper into a business career," said Erin Morehead, an institute participant from Grove City, Ohio. "Through my interaction with people in the business world and Calvin graduates, I learned how to use business techniques in everyday life. I realized a major or career in business gives me endless possibilities environment more specifically. It would not have come to fruition without the support of the CCIB."
