

Assessment Plan and 2005 Findings for Social Work

Discussion

Over time, graduating seniors self-rate their application of critical thinking skills as “well” or “acceptable” at a mean of 100 percent. Practicum instructors support this high rating, placing 98.6 percent of their students over these same years at “well” or “acceptable” in application of critical thinking skills. Both of these meet the program’s 85 percent threshold.

The direct performance measures show that Calvin students meet the program’s standard (mean score is 85 percent or higher) for success when producing a written analytic product.

Qualitative data from the 2005 Graduating Seniors’ Exit Questionnaire does note a request from some students for more rigor in the program, something which faculty have been aware of and are working to address.

In summary, data from both indirect and direct measures of performance meet program standards. The program judges Objective #1 to be successfully implemented.

Discussion

Over time, graduating seniors self-rate their understanding and practice of social work values and ethics as “well” or “acceptable” at a mean of 100 percent. Practicum instructors consistently over time back up this high rating, placing 100 percent of their students over the years at "high" or "acceptable" in their abilities to practice within the values and ethics of the social work profession. Both of these meet the program’s 85 percent threshold.

The direct performance measures show that Calvin students meet the program’s standard for success when producing a written analytic product.

In summary, data from both indirect measures and direct measures of performance meet program standards. The program judges Objective #2 to be successfully implemented.

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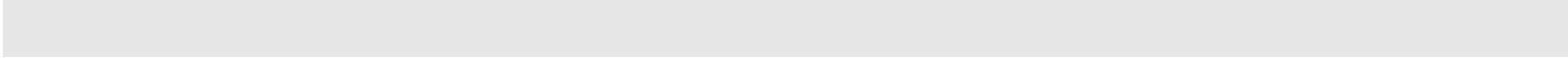

Discussion

Over time, graduating seniors self-rate their understanding of and respect for the positive value of diversity “well” or “acceptable” at a mean of 98 percent. Practicum instructors back up this high rating, placing 100 percent of their students at “high” or “acceptable.” Both of these meet the program’s 85 percent threshold.

The direct performance measures show that Calvin students meet the program’s standard for success when producing a written analytic product.

In summary, data from both indirect measures and direct measures of performance meet program standards. The program judges Objective #3 to be successfully implemented.

Discussion

Graduating BSW students self-report their understanding of oppression and discrimination as “well” or “acceptable” at a mean of 94 percent (Table 8.1I) and application of strategies of advocacy and social change as “well” or “acceptable” at a mean of 100 percent (Table 8.1J). Practicum instructors validate student rating, ranking their students over the same years at “high” or “average” at a mean of 100 percent and 98.7 percent respectively. Both of these meet the program’s 85 percent threshold.

The direct performance measures show that Calvin students meet the program’s standard for success when producing a written analytic product

In summary, the program judges Objective #4 to be successfully implemented.

Discussion

Graduating BSW students self-report their understanding of the history of the social work profession as “well” or “acceptable” at a mean of 100 percent across these years (Table 8.1L). Similarly, practicum instructors show a high mean rating of 100 percent in reporting students’ understanding of the history of the social work profession. Graduating BSW students self-report their understanding of the current structures and issues of the social work profession as “well” or “acceptable” at a mean of 98 percent across the years (Table 8.1M). Practicum instructors show a high mean rating of 100 percent in reporting students’ understanding of the current structures and issues of the social work profession.

The direct performance measures show that Calvin students meet the program’s standard for success when producing a written analytic product.

Overall, all data from Calvin’s indirect performance measures for understanding and interpreting the history of the social work profession and its contemporary structures and issues report greater than 85 percent of students meeting the “well” or “acceptable” criteria. Therefore, the program judges Objective #5 to be successfully implemented.

Discussion

Over time, graduating seniors self-rate their knowledge of a strengths perspective as “well” or “acceptable” at a mean of 100 percent, and their application of a strengths perspective also at a mean of 100 percent. Practicum instructors support these high ratings, placing 100 percent of their students over these same years at “well” or “acceptable” in both understanding and application of a strengths perspective. All of these meet the program’s 85 percent threshold.

The direct performance measures show that Calvin students meet the program’s standard (mean score is 85 percent or higher) for success when producing a written analytic product.

In summary, data from both indirect and direct measures of performance meet program standards. The program judges Objective #13 to be successfully implemented.

Discussion

Over time, graduating seniors self-rate their ability to integrate a Reformed perspective as “well” or “acceptable” at a mean of 100 percent. Practicum instructors are not asked this question because the program judges that it is not the responsibility of, nor is it appropriate to ask or expect the agency or the practicum instructor to teach content or provide learning opportunities with regard to a Reformed Christian perspective. The direct performance measures show that Calvin students meet the program’s standard (mean score is 85 percent or higher) for success when producing a written analytic product.

Qualitative data from the senior exit questionnaire strongly suggests that the program re-visit the capstone course offered during interim and revise; this work is already underway.

In summary, data from both indirect and direct measures of performance meet program standards. The program judges Objective #14 to be successfully implemented.

FINAL COMMENTS

The Social Work Program Committee's work in preparing for re-accreditation appears to have paid off in the 2004-2005 academic year. All direct and indirect measures for each program objective are met well above the program's 85 percent threshold.

One area for further attention is specific 2005 data from students and practicum instructors. For nearly every objective, the percent of "well" responses fell several percentage points from the previous years as evaluated by students and/or practicum instructors. While the combined score is still above the 85 percent threshold, the drop in "well" responses is worth more careful consideration.
