

Cross Country (Men's)

Under the direction of co-head coaches Brian Diemer and Al Hoekstra, the Calvin men's cross country team captured an unprecedented 19th straight MIAA title this fall, taking first place at the MIAA Championships. At the MIAA Championships, Calvin took seven of the top eight spots and posted a perfect score of 15 points. Junior Tim Finnegan (Los Alamos, NM) led the way with a first place time of 24:51. At the national meet, Calvin took second place to extend its string of top-four national finishes to eight straight years. Junior Tim Finnegan took third at the national meet to earn All-America honors for the third straight year. Also collecting All-America honors for Calvin were Jorritsma (34th place) and Christiansen (35th place). Rounding out Calvin's finishers were Gries in 56th overall and a time of 26:49.2; Reynolds at 73rd overall and a time of 26:57.9; Zwagerman 82nd at 27:03.6 and Hulst in 118th with a time of 27:25.9.

Cross Country (Women's)

After seeing its string of 16 straight MIAA titles snapped in 2004, the Calvin women's cross country team returned to the top of the MIAA standings, winning the league title with a first place score of 22 points at the MIAA Championships. Calvin junior Lydia Singer (Wilmington, DE) took first place at the conference championships and was named the MIAA's Most Valuable Runner. She also earned a spot on the All-MIAA first team and was joined on the first team from Calvin by junior Laura Holtrop (Derwood, MD), sophomore Christina Overbeck (Seattle, WA) senior Lindsay Rooney (Denver, CO) and freshman Calah Schlabach (St. Michael's, AZ). Named to the All-MIAA second team from Calvin were freshman Kelly Edwards (Grand Blanc, MI) and Emily Arkus (Tinley Park, IL). At the Great Lakes Regional meet, Calvin took second place with a team score of 105 points, earning a trip to the NCAA III Championships for the 16th time in school history which ranks fourth on the NCAA III list. At the national meet hosted by Ohio Wesleyan University in Delaware, Ohio, Calvin placed 17th with a team score of 419 points. Singer was Calvin's top individual finisher, placing 68th with a time of 23:34.

Golf (Men's)

Under the direction of first-year head coach Brian Bolt, the Calvin men's golf team took fifth in the final MIAA standings. The Knights were led by junior Jeff TenBrink (Kalamazoo, MI) who took seventh in the final MIAA individual standings with a season-average of 75.6 strokes-per-round. TenBrink's average was a new Calvin single-season record, breaking the previous mark of 76.0 strokes-per-round set by Phil Rietema in 2003. TenBrink also earned a spot on the All-MIAA second team. Freshman Brad Tindall (Vicksburg, MI) also cracked the top-15 in the MIAA individual standings, placing 14th with an average of 78.4 strokes-per-round.

Golf (Women's)

Led by head coach Jerry Bergsma, the Calvin women's golf team took eighth place in the final MIAA standings. Senior Annie Huizenga (Hudsonville, MI) led the Knights throughout the year, finishing seventh in the final MIAA individual standings with an average of 86.2 strokes-per-round. Her average was a new Calvin single-season record, breaking her own school mark by more than three strokes. Earlier in the fall, Huizenga captured medalist honors at the Calvin-Hope Invitational for the second straight year, firing a round of 81 at the Thornapple Pointe Golf Club. Huizenga also earned a spot on the All-MIAA second team. Senior Margaret Tassaró (Carnegie, PA) was Calvin's second-best finisher, placing 22nd individually with an average of 92.2 strokes-per-

round which ranks as the 7th-best average in Calvin women's golf history. Junior Abby Stemler (Elk River, MN) was 30th in the final MIAA standings with an average of 100.2 strokes-per-round.

Soccer (Men's)

Under the leadership of head coach Chris Hughes, the Calvin men's soccer team advanced to the NCAA III Tournament for the second straight year as the Knights received an at-large bid to the national tournament. During the regular season, Calvin took second in the MIAA standings, posting an 11-3-0 conference mark. Calvin opened NCAA III Tournament play with a 4-0 victory over Edgewood College (WI) to advance to a second round game at second-ranked and unbeaten Ohio Wesleyan University. Calvin upset the Battling Bishops 2-1 on a pair of second-half goals by senior Kurt Visker (Grand Rapids, MI). Calvin was then chosen to host the sectional round and in its Sweet 16 game against Fredonia State of New York, battled the Blue Devils to a 0-0 double-overtime tie on a field surrounded by snow. The game ended in a penalty kick shootout with Fredonia State winning the shootout 3-2.

With the tie against Fredonia State, Calvin finished its 2005 campaign with a 17-4-2 overall record. Visker was named to the All-MIAA first team for the fourth straight year, becoming just the seventh individual in MIAA men's soccer history to achieve the feat. He was joined on the All-MIAA first team by Calvin senior Peter Malefyt (Lansing, IL) and junior Nick Capisciolto (Hudsonville, MI). Named to the All-MIAA second team from Calvin were seniors Joe Westra (Grand Rapids, MI) and Levi Kool (Holland, MI) and junior Maurice Wright (Wauwatosa, WI). Capisciolto finished the year with 17 assists, matching a Calvin single-season record while also ranking him third nationally in assists-per-game average. Visker was then named to the Great Lakes All-Region first team while Malefyt landed a spot on the second team and Capisciolto a spot on the third team. Finally, Visker was named a first team All-American by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America, becoming the first player in Calvin men's soccer history to receive All-America honors in back-to-back years.

Soccer (Women's)

Led by head coach Mark Recker, Calvin captured its first MIAA title since 1997 and advanced to the NCAA III Tournament for the first time since 1998. Calvin finished the year with an overall record of 16-3-2 and an MIAA mark of 15-1-0. Calvin opened the year with a Labor Day weekend trip to San Diego, California. While there, Calvin fell to nationally-ranked Azusa-Pacific 2-1 but came back to defeat host Point Loma Nazarene 2-1. Calvin shared the final MIAA title with Hope College as the two rivals split a pair of conference matches.

In the NCAA III Tournament, Calvin met 12th-ranked Ohio Wesleyan University in a four-team regional hosted by Otterbein College in the suburbs of Columbus, Ohio. Calvin battled Ohio Wesleyan to a 2-2 double-overtime tie with junior Jill Capel (Hudsonville, MI) scoring both goals for the Knights. The game then advanced to a penalty kick shootout with Ohio Wesleyan winning the shootout 6-5.

Capel was later named the MIAA's Most Valuable Player after winning the MIAA scoring title for the second straight year. She also earned a spot on the All-MIAA first team for a third straight year as did junior teammate Sarah Weesies (Kalamazoo, MI) who finished second to Capel in the league scoring race. They were joined on the All-MIAA first team from Calvin by freshman Elizabeth Ribbens (Tinley Park, IL). Named to the All-MIAA second team from Calvin were senior Kara Zuidema (Escondido, CA), junior Tricia DeVries (Grand Rapids, MI) and freshman Ashley Bolen (Urbana, IL). In addition, Capel was named to the Great Lakes All-Region third team. Capel finished 17th nationally in points-per-game average (2.62) while Weesies finished 20th (2.48). Capel also finished 28th in goals-per-game (1.00) and 24th in assists-per-game (0.62). As a team, Calvin finished with the nation's four-best scoring offense with an average of 4.14 goals-per-game. Calvin also finished 18th nationally in shutout percentage (0.67) and 24th in winning percentage (.810).

Volleyball

Guided by head coach Amber Warners, the Calvin women's volleyball team captured its third MIAA title in the last five years, advanced to the NCAA III Tournament for the second straight year and reached the 30-win mark for the first time since 1995. Calvin finished the year with a 30-9 record, winning 13 of its final 14 matches. During the year, Calvin captured the title of its own Midwest Invitational, upsetting nationally-ranked Ohio Northern and then defeating rival Hope in a thrilling four-game match. One week later, Calvin and Hope met again but this time in the MIAA Tournament Championship finals in Holland and the result was a thrilling five-game Calvin victory. The victory gave Calvin the MIAA's automatic bid to the NCAA III Tournament. In the national tournament, Calvin opened with victories over Hiram (OH) and Millikin (IL) before falling to fourth-ranked Wittenberg University in a national semi-quarterfinal match. Calvin senior Christine Hendricks (Cincinnati, OH) was a catalyst for the Knights, landing a spot on the All-MIAA first team and the Great Lakes All-Region team. She was later named a Division III honorable mention All-American.

Hendricks was joined on the All-MIAA first team by Calvin junior Lorilyn Vogel (Orange City, IA) and sophomore Katie Zondervan (Lakewood, CA). Junior Molly Krikke (Greenwich, OH) and freshman Lauren DeGroot were both named to the second team with DeGroot receiving MIAA Freshman and Defensive Player of the Year honors. Over the course of the year, Zondervan established a new Calvin single-season record for assists (1,840) and a new Calvin single-match record for service aces (14). In addition, Vogel established a new Calvin single-season record for kills (601) and DeGroot a new Calvin single-season mark for digs (697).

Calvin also finished highly ranked in the final NCAA III statistics. Individually, Zondervan was ranked third in assists-per-game average (13.43), finishing just behind Veronica Stephens of Austin (13.46) and Megan Taylor of Hiram (13.49). Krikke also placed 39th in blocks-per-game (1.31) while Vogel finished 21st in kills-per-game (4.39). As a team, Calvin led the nation in assists-per-game with an average of 14.65 assists-per-game. Calvin also placed 31st in blocks-per-game (2.74) and 25th in hitting percentage (.254).

Winter Sports

Basketball (Men's)

Under the direction of 10th-year head coach Kevin Vande Streek, the men's basketball team had a banner year, winning its first MIAA regular season title since 2002 and earning a bid to the NCAA III Tournament for the third consecutive year. The season was a year of milestones for the Knights as they reached the 20-win plateau for the 15th time in school history. In addition, Vande Streek recorded his 300th overall victory at the collegiate level and his 200th victory at Calvin during the year.

Another milestone was set by senior forward Andy Draayer (Denver, Colo.) who became Calvin's career leader in three-point field goals, finishing his career with 222 three-pointers, breaking the previous career mark of 188 set by 1992 Calvin alumnus Todd Hennink.

Calvin opened the year with a 2-3 record and was in danger of falling to 2-4 as it trailed a visiting Trinity Christian College (IL) team by 18 points in the second half of a November 30 game at the Calvin Fieldhouse. The Knights then waged a furious comeback, scoring seven points in the final minute of play to pull out a 75-74 victory in front of a delirious home crowd. The win over the Trolls was the first of a stretch that saw the Knights win 20 of 22 games including a 59-58 victory over rival Hope on a last-second three-point shot by freshman Caleb Veldhouse (Sioux Falls, SD). The win over the third-ranked Flying Dutchmen allowed Calvin to move into sole possession of first place in the MIAA standings. Picked to finish third in the MIAA pre-season coaches' poll proceeded to win its final three regular season games to finish one game ahead of Hope and clinch the MIAA regular season crown.

Calvin then advanced to the MIAA Tournament Championship game with tournament victories over Olivet and Kalamazoo but fell to Hope 68-55 in the title tilt. Despite the loss, Calvin gained an at-large bid to the NCAA III Tournament the following week and opened tournament play with an impressive 79-71 first round victory over the University of Wisconsin-LaCrosse at Hope's DeVos Fieldhouse. The victory set up a fourth meeting between Calvin and Hope with this meeting coming in the second round of the NCAA III Tournament. Trailing by nine points at halftime, Calvin mounted another second half comeback but fell just short by a 70-67 score.

Senior Kyle Trehwella (Rockford, MI) and Veldhouse were both named to the All-MIAA first team while Draayer and junior center Josh Meckes (Bay City, MI) were named to the All-MIAA second team. Meckes finished the year with 48 blocked shots, raising his career total to 128 which ranks third on the Calvin career list. Veldhouse was also later named to the D3hoops.com Great Lakes All-Region third team and to the Division III News National All-Freshman Team.

Basketball (Women's)

Led by third-year head coach John Ross, the women's basketball team finished 23-5 overall and advanced to the NCAA III Tournament for the second straight year including the 10th time in school history.

With one senior, one junior, four sophomores and six freshmen, the Knights featured a youthful look but came of age early in the season, upsetting nationally-ranked Simpson College (IA) and Wheaton College (IL) during the non-conference season.

An early-season highlight came in the season's opening weekend as the Knights won the Wisconsin-Lutheran Tip-Off Tournament, defeating host Wisconsin Lutheran in the championship game. Junior center Lisa Winkle (Grand Rapids, Mich.) was named the tournament's MVP and was joined on the all-tournament team by freshman Marcia Harris (Grand Rapids, Mich.).

Picked to finish third in the MIAA pre-season coaches' poll, Calvin took second in the league campaign, posting a 14-2 conference record with its only two conference defeats coming against eventual national champion Hope College. Calvin then advanced to the MIAA Tournament Championship game with tournament victories over Adrian and Alma. In the MIAA Tournament Championship game, Calvin fell to Hope 63-44 despite trailing by just four points with six minutes to play.

Despite the loss, Calvin received an at-large bid to the NCAA III Tournament and journeyed to St. Louis to compete in a four-team regional hosted by Washington University. Calvin's tournament run was a quick one as the Knights suffered a 64-57 first round defeat to Carroll College (WI).

At the conclusion of the season, Lisa Winkle received a raft of post-season accolades as she was named to the All-MIAA first team and to the D3hoops.com Great Lakes All-Region first team. In addition, she was named a honorable mention All-American by D3hoops.com and a third team All-American by Women's Division III News. Over the course of the season, Winkle collected 16 double-double efforts (points and rebounds) and finished the year in fourth place on the Calvin career scoring list (1,271 points) and in second place on the Calvin career rebounding list (713 rebounds). She was later named a second Academic All-American® by ESPN The Magazine, becoming the first Calvin women's basketball player to be so honored.

A 6-1 forward, Harris also received post-season honors as she was named to the All-MIAA first team and was the only freshman from a league school to receive all-conference citations. Harris was then named to the Women's Division III News All-Freshman Team.

Swim & Diving (Men's)

Under the leadership of 10th-year head coach Dan Gelderloos, the men's swimming and diving team took third place in the final MIAA standings, achieving a pre-season team goal. In dual meet competition, Calvin posted an overall record of 4-8 but went 3-2 against league foes, defeating Alma, Albion and Kalamazoo.

At the conference meet held at the Jenison Aquatics Center, Calvin recorded a third place team score of 314 points, finishing 20 points ahead of fourth place Kalamazoo and 21 points ahead of fifth place Albion. Although Calvin had no conference champions at the league meet, the Knights were not without several standout performances. Senior captain Luke Bagnall (Marshalltown, IA) was the anchor of the team, placing third in the 400 IM (4:14.02), fourth in the 200 IM (1:57.60) and fifth in the 200 butterfly (2:00.13). Sophomore John Boumgarden (Naperville, IL) had a big three days of competition at the league meet, placing second in the 100 freestyle (47.04), third in the 100 butterfly (52.33) and sixth in the 50 freestyle (21.72). For his efforts, Boumgarden landed a spot

on the All-MIAA team for the first time in his career. Sophomore Joe Gluvers (Rocklin, CA) also had a strong conference meet, taking second in the 200 butterfly (1:59.14), eighth in the 400 IM (4:26.33) and 11th in the 200 IM (2:02.37).

Juniors Peter Tuuk (Grand Rapids, Mich.) and Andrew Resseguie (Holland, Mich.) paced the Knights in the freestyle events with Tuuk taking second in the 200 freestyle (1:43.57), sixth in the 500 freestyle (4:48.22) and 10th in the 100 freestyle (48.21) while Resseguie was fifth in the 50 freestyle (21.68), seventh in the 100 freestyle (47.09) and 10th in the 200 freestyle (1:46.71). Freshman Keith Conrad (Wheaton, IL) also played a key role, taking fifth in the 1,650 freestyle (16:51.55), seventh in the 100 butterfly (53.02) and seventh in the 500 freestyle (4:49.70).

Calvin also had several strong efforts in the relay events. Calvin's 200 freestyle relay team of freshman Jordan Resseguie (Holland, Mich.), Tuuk, Boumgarden and Bagnall took third place (1:25.65) while its 400 freestyle relay team of Boumgarden, Andrew Resseguie, Bagnall and Tuuk took second with a time of 3:09.53. Calvin's 800 freestyle relay team of Boumgarden, Bagnall, Andrew Resseguie and Tuuk took second place with a time of 6:57.82.

In addition, freshman diver Jack Ryfiak (Belding, Mich.) swept up a number of points at the conference meet, placing third on the one-meter board (410.75) and fourth on the three-meter board (378.70).

Swim & Diving (Women's)

Also directed by Dan Gelderloos, the women's swimming and diving team had a historic year, winning the MIAA Championship for the second straight year and then tying for sixth place at the NCAA III Championships. Over the course of the year, Calvin shattered 10 school records including four in relay events. Calvin finished the dual meet season with an 11-3 record and went 6-0 against MIAA schools.

At the MIAA Championships held at the Jenison Aquatics Center, Calvin posted a first place total of 621.5 points, marking the seventh-highest point total in MIAA women's swimming and diving history and the highest by a Calvin swimming and diving team.

Scores at the Championships include Calvin first place finishes in 13 of a possible 19 events. Junior Becky Weima (Caledonia, Mich.) led the way, taking first place in the 100 freestyle (50.95), 200 freestyle (1:49.65) and 500 freestyle (4:59.53), setting MIAA records in all three events. Weima also broke an MIAA record in the 50 freestyle while leading off Calvin's first place 200 freestyle relay team with a 50 split time of 23.52. In the morning prelims, Calvin's 200 freestyle relay of Weima, junior Liz Ingebrigtsen (Bensenville, IL), freshman Cara VanWoerkom (Wyoming, Mich.) and sophomore Kat Vinson (Kaneohe, HI) established a new MIAA record with a time of 1:35.83.

Freshman diver Erica Deur (Holland, Mich.) also had a huge conference meet, winning the one and three-meter diving competitions. In the one-meter competition, Deur came up with a score of 451.65 points, breaking the previous record of 447.65 set by Calvin's Sari Brummel in 1987. In the three-meter competition, Deur won with an MIAA-record score of 467.80 points, breaking the previous record set by Kalamazoo's Lynn Achterberg in 1985.

Junior Alex Wilson (Ellsworth, OH) was another double-winner for the Knights, taking the gold in the 400 IM (4:38.32) and 200 breaststroke (2:25.45). Other individual winners from Calvin included senior Abby Johnson (Grand Haven, Mich.) in the 200 IM (2:09.71) and junior Barbara Frazier (Placerville, Calif.) in the 100 breaststroke (1:08.61). Calvin also won four of the five relay events. In addition to its 200 freestyle relay, Calvin also took first place in the 400 medley relay (3:54.50), the 400 freestyle relay (3:30.73) and the 800 freestyle relay (7:42.60) with the 400 freestyle relay also establishing a new MIAA record.

Weima was then named the MIAA's Most Outstanding Swimmer for the third straight year while Deur was named the MIAA's Most Outstanding Diver. Weima and Deur were both named to the All-MIAA team and were joined from Calvin on the team by Johnson, Wilson, Frazier, Ingebrigtsen, senior Laura Miersma (Holland, Mich.), sophomore Stephanie Duncan (Long Grove, Ill.) and Vinson. Johnson was named to the All-MIAA team for the fourth straight year, becoming the sixth individual in Calvin women's swimming and diving history to be so honored.

Calvin then sent 10 individuals to the NCAA III Championships hosted by Carleton College in Minneapolis.

Spring Sports

Baseball

Calvin finished 17-23 overall and fourth in the MIAA standings with a 15-13 conference mark. Calvin opened the year by winning just three of its first 14 games but then picked up steam, winning eight games in a row—all of which were conference games. Heading into the final two weeks of the season, the Knights were in strong contention for a winning season but dropped all four games of a series with rival Hope. Calvin rebounded to win three of its final four games, however, to finish the year on a winning note.

During the year, two Calvin players received conference honors: Senior Kyle Hollemans (Kentwood, Mich.) was named MIAA Player of the Week during week No. 3, while freshman Nate Pocock (Wayland, Mass.) was named MIAA Pitcher of the Week during week No. 5 of the conference campaign.

Freshman shortstop Jacob Vriesman (Denver, Colo.) led Calvin in batting average with a .304 clip. In a season-ending doubleheader with Tri-State, Vriesman belted a grand-slam home run. Senior Mark Tigechelaar (Grand Rapids, Mich.) led Calvin in RBIs (26), while junior Nick Caudle (Grandville, Mich.) led Calvin in home runs (three), including a walk-off home run in a midseason victory over Alma. Senior Andy Draayer (Denver, Colo.) was Calvin's top pitcher. Draayer was 4-4 on the year and led Calvin in earned run average (3.86), innings pitched (56) and finished tied for the team lead in victories.

Softball

Calvin finished 13-21 overall and in seventh place in the MIAA standings with a 5-11 conference mark. Calvin's squad featured a youthful look as the roster consisted of just one senior, three juniors, three sophomores and six freshmen. A midseason highlight included a non-conference doubleheader sweep over local rival Cornerstone. Cornerstone would later advance to the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) World Series.

Senior shortstop Jeanne Cole (Fountain, Mich.) led Calvin throughout the year, batting .352 at the plate with two home runs and a team-leading 19 RBIs, despite battling injuries for most of the season. She finished her career as Calvin's all-time leader in hits (167) and runs scored (106). She was later named to the All-MIAA first team for the fourth straight year, becoming just the sixth individual in MIAA softball history to do so, including the second from Calvin.

Calvin built its pitching staff around freshman right-hander Kristin Folkerts (Grand Rapids, Mich.) and junior left-hander Ruth Anna Spooner (Twin Falls, Idaho). Folkerts was 10-9 during the year with a 4.08 earned run average, while Spooner was 3-12 with a 2.71 earned run average. Spooner also struck out 92 batters in 87.2 innings of work.

Tennis (Men's)

Head Coach John Ross guided the men's tennis team, which produced an impressive overall dual-match record of 14-5 and a conference mark of 5-1. The Knights then took third at the MIAA tournament with a score of 56.5 points to finish tied for second in the final MIAA standings. In addition, Calvin finished the year ranked 11th in the Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA) Division III Central Region rankings. During the year, Calvin gained dual-match victories over regionally ranked Chicago (ninth), Grinnell (14th) and Hope (13th).

At the MIAA tournament, Calvin had two individuals take second place in singles play as senior Rafael Siebenschein (Lynden, Wash.) was second at No. 2 singles and junior Dan Volkema (Spring Lake, Mich.) second at No. 5 singles. At No. 3 singles, freshman Marcus Zeilstra (Oak Brook, Ill.) took third place, while senior Ryan DeNooyer (Kalamazoo, Mich.) was third at No. 5 singles and sophomore Michael Goorhouse (Holland, Mich.) third at No. 6 singles.

Sophomore Ricky Tilton (Gap, Pa.) was then named to the All-MIAA first team, while Siebenschein and Zeilstra were named to the second team. Siebenschein finished the year with an overall win-loss record of 16-5, while Volkema was 15-4 and Zeilstra 17-6. Siebenschein and Tilton were then named to the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District first team, becoming the first players in Calvin men's tennis history to do so.

For the second straight year, the Calvin men's tennis team has received the prestigious All-Academic Team Award from the International Tennis Association (ITA). The ITA All-Academic Team award is open to any ITA program that has a cumulative team grade point average of 3.20 or above (on a 4.00 scale). The Calvin men's tennis team posted a cumulative team GPA of 3.67.

Tennis (Women's)

The women's tennis team was led by Coach Jerry Bergsma and finished the year with an overall dual-match record of 12-8 and a conference record of 6-2. Calvin then took second at the MIAA tournament with a score of 93 points to finish in second place in the final MIAA standings. The point total was Calvin's highest at an MIAA tournament competition, while its final overall league finish was its best since 2000, when it also finished in second place. In addition, Calvin finished the year ranked 13th in the ITA Division III Central Region rankings.

Calvin opened the dual-match season with a 0-4 record but rebounded to win 12 of its final 16 matches, including a key 5-4 victory over rival Hope and an 8-1 victory at St. Mary's.

Two Calvin individuals claimed singles titles at the MIAA tournament, as junior Kari Lipinski (Grand Rapids, Mich.) took first at No. 4 singles and senior Kim Bosscher (Grandville, Mich.) took first at No. 6 singles. Bosscher finished the year with a singles record of 19-2, while Lipinski finished with a season singles record of 16-5. Junior Allyson Logan (Fort Wayne, Ind.) also had a strong singles performance, taking runner-up honors at No. 5 singles. Logan finished the year with a singles record of 16-7. Calvin also received a fourth-place finish from senior Amy Zeilstra (Oak Brook, Ill.) at No. 1 singles and a third-place finish from senior Annie Huizenga (Hudsonville, Mich.) at No. 3 singles.

In doubles, Calvin's No. 1 doubles team of Zeilstra and sophomore Emily Oosterhouse (Grand Rapids, Mich.) took fourth, while its No. 2 doubles team of Huizenga and Lipinski took second. In addition, Calvin's No. 3 doubles team of Logan and Bosscher took runner-up honors.

At the tournament's conclusion, Zeilstra was named to the All-MIAA first team for the third straight year, while Huizenga was named to the All-MIAA second team for the first time. Bosscher was then named to the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District first team, becoming the first player in Calvin women's tennis history to do so.

Track & Field (Men's)

Under the direction of Coach Jong-il Kim, put together a banner season, capturing an unprecedented 13th consecutive MIAA title, finishing 6-0 in MIAA dual-meet competition and then taking first place at the MIAA field day with 284.5 points. The point total was the highest in MIAA men's track and field history.

During the year, Calvin broke a pair of records as senior Nate Meckes (Bay City, Mich.) broke his own record in the shot put (58-9), while sophomore Ryan Jensen (Grand Rapids, Mich.) set a new record in the hammer throw (176-3).

At the MIAA field day hosted by Albion, Calvin took first place in 13 of a possible 19 events. Nate Meckes and sophomore Kelby McClelland (Mercer, Pa.) were both double winners, with Meckes winning the shot put (58-9) and discus (175-10), while McClelland was a winner in the 110 high hurdles (15.10) and 400-meter hurdles (54.93). McClelland was later named the MIAA's Most Valuable Runner. The winning throws by Meckes in the shot put and discus were both MIAA record marks. Meckes also won the shot put for the fourth consecutive year, becoming just the third individual in MIAA men's track and field history to do so and the first since 1930. For his efforts, Meckes was named the MIAA's Most Valuable Field Event Performer for the third time in his career.

Other individual winners for Calvin included freshman Michael Buist (Grand Rapids, Mich.) in the high jump (6-7¼), freshman Jed Christiansen (Greenville, Pa.) in the 5,000 meters (15:09.24), junior Tim Finnegan (Los Alamos, N.M.) in the 10,000 meters (31:44.75), senior Chris Friebel (Fairborn, Ohio) in the 200 meters (21.87), senior Harrison Jorritsma (Beamsville, Ont.) in the 3,000-meter steeplechase (9:34.59), junior Josh Meckes (Bay City, Mich.) in the long jump (23-9½) and junior Todd Schuster (Denver, Colo.) in the 800 meters (1:54.23). Josh Meckes' winning effort in the long jump was a new MIAA record.

Calvin's 4x100-meter relay team of Friebel, McClelland, sophomore Jared Cok (Bozeman, Mont.) and sophomore Joel Baker (Kalamazoo, Mich.) took first place with a time of 42.64, while its 4x400-meter relay team of Schuster, Cok, Friebel and Baker took first place with a time of 3:19.41. Calvin then placed 11 individuals on the All-MIAA team, including Baker, Buist, Christiansen, Finnegan, Friebel, senior Justin Grasmeyer (Norwalk, Calif.), Jorritsma, McClelland, Josh Meckes, Nate Meckes and Schuster.

Calvin sent 11 athletes to the NCAA III Track and Field Championships at Benedictine University in Lisle, Ill. Prior to the national meet, Nate Meckes was named Great Lakes Regional Field Event Athlete of the Year for the third time in his career. He then took second in the shot put with a throw of 57-9½, posting the fifth All-American performance of his collegiate career, including his third in the shot put.

Finnegan and Buist also claimed All-American certificates, with Finnegan taking sixth in the 10,000 meters (30:55.31) and Buist fourth in the high jump (6-9).

In addition, Calvin placed three individuals on the *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-District team as Grasmeyer, Jorritsma and Nate Meckes were so honored. Nate Meckes was later named a third team Academic All-American by *ESPN The Magazine*, while Jorritsma was named to the first team.

Finally, Calvin placed second in the final Division III power rankings with a team score of 217.13 points, marking its best-ever finish in the ranking system sponsored by the M-F Athletic Co.

Track & Field (Women's)

The Calvin women's track and field put together a sensational spring campaign. Over the course of the year, the Knights captured an unprecedented 17th straight MIAA title, took fifth at the NCAA III Championships and finished third in the final Division III power rankings with a team score of 203.74 points.

During the conference campaign, Calvin went 6-0 in dual meets, stretching its MIAA dual-meet win streak to 83 meets, dating back to 1989. At the MIAA field day hosted by Albion College, Calvin posted a first-place score of 347.5 points, marking the third-best team score in MIAA women's track and field history. Calvin took first place in 17 of a possible 19 events, with four athletes winning double events.

Double winners for Calvin included senior Camille Medema (Grand Rapids, Mich.) in the 800 (2:18.38) and 1,500 meters (4:47.1), junior Megann VanderVliet (Oakville, Ont.) in the shot put (41-6½) and discus (142-2), junior Lisa Winkle (Grand Rapids, Mich.) in the long jump (18-5) and 400 meters (57.43), and sophomore Sarah Wittingen (East Grand Rapids, Mich.) in the 100-meter hurdles (14.53) and 400-meter hurdles (1:03.00). Wittingen's time in the 100-meter hurdles was a new MIAA record.

Senior Missy Smith (Ada, Mich.) also posted a new MIAA record in winning the pole vault with a height of 12-6, while junior Kati Bolt (Grand Rapids, Mich.) did the same in winning the high jump with a height of 5-6.

Other individual winners for Calvin included freshman Julie Bratt (Lynden, Wash.) in the triple jump (36-5), senior Christine Hendricks (Cincinnati, Ohio) in the javelin (121-1), junior Laura Holtrop (Rockville, Md.) in the 5,000 meters (18:45.91), sophomore Christina Overbeck in the 10,000 meters (39:45.30) and junior Lydia Singer (Wilmington, Del.) in the 3,000-meter steeplechase (11:26.67). Calvin's 4x100-meter relay team of junior Lisa Geelhoed (Grand Rapids, Mich.), junior Lorilyn Vogel (Orange City, Iowa), Wittingen and Winkle took first place with a time of 48.39, while its 4x400-meter relay team of freshman Jennifer DeFauw (Harper Woods, Mich.), Bolt, Wittingen and Winkle took first place with a time of 3:56.35.

At the conclusion of the meet, Wittingen was named the MIAA's Most Valuable Runner, while Hendricks was named the MIAA's Most Valuable Field Performer.

Calvin also placed 13 individuals on the All-MIAA team: Bolt, Bratt, freshman Ashley Glover (Grand Rapids, Mich.), Hendricks, Holtrop, Medema, Overbeck, Singer, Smith, VanderVliet, Vogel, Winkle and Wittingen.

Calvin then sent 13 individuals on to the NCAA III Championships hosted by Benedictine University in Lisle, Ill. At the national meet, Calvin took fifth place with a team score of 40 points, producing nine All-American performances along the way.

The night before the meet opened, Hendricks was named the Great Lakes Regional Field Event Athlete of the Year. Hendricks then captured the national title in the heptathlon, posting an NCAA III Championships record total of 5,012 points. In doing so, Hendricks became the eighth individual national champion in Calvin women's track and field history.

Winkle also had a big meet, as she had a hand in four All-American performances, taking seventh in the long jump (18-5¾), fourth in the 400 meters (55.87), anchoring Calvin's 4x100-meter relay that took eighth (47.95) and anchoring Calvin's 4x400-meter relay team that took fourth (3:48.20). Winkle was joined on the 4x100-meter relay team by Geelhoed, Wittingen and Vogel and on the 4x400-meter relay team by Lauren Bergstrom (Rochester, MN), Bolt and Wittingen, with DeFauw serving as an alternate. Wittingen also came up with an individual All-American effort, taking sixth in the 400-meter hurdles (1:01.70), while VanderVliet was an All-American in the shot put, placing seventh with a throw of 45-1.

Calvin also received third-place finishes from Smith in the pole vault (12-2½) and Medema in the 800 meters (2:13.44).

Over the course of the season, Calvin established five school records, with Hendricks doing so in the heptathlon (5,012 points), Medema in the 800 meters (2:10.31), Smith in the pole vault (12-7), Vogel in the triple jump (37-3) and Wittingen in the 100-meter hurdles (14.32). In addition, Hendricks and Smith were named first team Academic All-Americans by *ESPN The Magazine*, while Winkle and Wittingen were named to the *ESPN The Magazine* All-District team.
