Basics of Public Speaking

Steps in Choosing a Topic

- Choose a topic that interests you.
- Consider aspects of topic that would interest your audience.
- Should be targeted at your audience's level of understanding and interest.

Thesis

- Should be a declarative sentence.
- Should be a single idea.
- Should reflect consideration of audience.

Prepare Main Points after Thesis

- Each main point sentence must be declarative.
- Should summarize the theme of that section.
- Develops and refers back to the thesis

Develop Each Main Point

 Use a variety of evidence (statistics, examples, quotes from experts) and be sure to verbally cite sources. Choose sources that audience will find credible.

Prepare Introduction after Main Points

- Capture attention (short story/example, startling statistic, quote, rhetorical question).
- Relate topic to audience and establish credibility as speaker.
- State thesis and preview main points.

After Introduction, Prepare Conclusion

- Summarize main points or thesis.
- Provide closure and If appropriate, call to action.

Evaluate Need for Visual Aid

• Decide where you need to convey information that you cannot convey easily verbally.

Delivery

- Use voice (rate, pitch, volume) to emphasize key ideas.
- Use eye contact.
- Use gestures and movement to emphasize key ideas.
